2009 LEGISLATIVE WRAP-UP

HOPE AMONG THE RUINS

After the trials and tribulations of 2008, Albany leapt back into the spotlight this year when New York State Senate Republicans and Democrats began playing tug of war with the keys to the Senate chamber.

By now you've heard the sordid story. A leadership struggle in the State Senate led to chaos, partisan finger-pointing, multiple legal challenges, and a five-week legislative stalemate.

As a result, more New Yorkers are paying attention to the State Capital than ever before, although for all the wrong reasons.

Prior to the stalemate, major environmental measures were winding their way through the committee process. After the coup, legislative activity sputtered. In the end, only seven environmental bills passed the upper house. That's far fewer bills than average, although some of the measures are significant.

Bright Spots in a Dim Picture

For the third year in a row, one of the environmental community's priority Super Bills passed both houses. This year, the Bigger Better Bottle Bill expanded the nickel deposit to bottled waters and will keep millions of containers out of our landfills and landscapes.

A bill ensuring that revenues raised by the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative, the 10-state plan to reduce global warming pollution from power plants, will be used to make homes and businesses more energy efficient and create the green labor force to do it, passed unanimously in the Assembly. Green Jobs-Green New York went on to pass the Senate by a vote of 52-8. It's significant that 21 Republicans voted against their leader, Senator Dean Skelos, to support this major environmental initiative.

New York finally has a reauthorized energy planning process guided by statute and the Metropolitan Transportation Authority should have enough resources to operate a robust transit system.

In fiscal matters, the State Legislature stopped some of the hemorrhaging from the Environmental Protection Fund, the funding stream for environmental projects statewide. Lawmakers will likely be called upon to

protect the Fund again next year.

The Assembly passed about 40 environmentally significant bills this year, continuing its tradition of sending a healthy green slate of legislation to their Senate colleagues.

Gov's Green Record Dying on the Vine

With state finances under pressure due to the economic recession, Governor David Paterson hacked away at the State's regulatory agencies in the name of cost cutting. Thanks to his careless action, the Department of Environmental Conservation is facing its lowest staffing levels in more than 20 years.

Also early in the year, the Governor let slip that he might weaken rules that guide the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative in order to favor polluters. He changed his mind thanks to a little prodding.

August 7th marked one of the Governor's lowest points this year, when with the ink barely dry on an Executive Order designed to help address climate change, he began an ill-conceived regulatory review process intended to undercut regulations designed to protect public health and safety.

The Scores

The majority party in the Senate for the first time in decades, Senate Democrats' average score was 45 points higher than their Republican counterparts in 2009. The green gap is wider than ever, reversing a trend toward more balanced scores. In this year's *Voters' Guide*, 66 points separate the Senate's best scores from the worst. 2010 Legislative Outlook

It's likely that Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver (D-NYC) and dozens of his colleagues, especially Environmental Conservation Committee Chair Robert Sweeney (D-Lindenhurst), will continue sending the Senate a robust menu of environmental bills in 2010. Year after year, Speaker Silver shows a strong commitment to environmental protection, which is one of the reasons why EPL/Environmental Advocates is honoring the Speaker's efforts this year on Page 3.

Reform?

What's less clear is whether much-hyped "reform" in the State Senate will open the gates for movement on environmental legislation. If the partisan atmosphere subsides in the Legislature's upper house—as it may have during the Green Jobs-Green New York vote—new reforms could set the stage for major advances in environmental protection and a healthier legislative body. If and when that happens, legislation that requires manufacturers to take back electronic waste or allows citizens to challenge state environmental quality review act determinations may finally make it across the finish line.

Will 2009 Turmoil Decide 2010 Elections?

With redistricting on the horizon, next year's election is critical. All of New York State's incumbents are in the crosshairs with furious voters and must go to great lengths to redeem themselves back home. And if that's the case, environmental protection and further investment in a green economy should be on their short list.

As you make up your mind next November, the *Voters' Guide* can help you see who supported protecting New York's environment—the health of our air, land and water, as well as 19 million New Yorkers—and who didn't. It's your New York and our lasting legacy. Decide wisely.

2009 OIL SLICK AWARD



CRAIG JOHNSON (D-GARDEN CITY)

In a year chock full of villains, Senator Craig Johnson stands apart from his peers. EPL/Environmental Advocates is giving the Senator this year's "Oil Slick" award for derailing environmental initiatives, despite the support of his colleagues, the Assembly and Governor's Office.

As 2009 began, hopes for environmental bills were high. Democrats had control of the Senate for the first time in decades—by a razor-thin two seats. Negotiations between the houses and the Governor produced legislation that would require manufacturers to recycle toxic electronic waste ("E-waste"). E-waste is an environmental hazard, and this bill would address a

growing waste stream, protect public health and safety, and lower municipalities' disposal costs.

But Senator Johnson thwarted progress on E-waste. When the measure came to the floor for a vote on July 16th, he abandoned his conference and spoke out against the bill, saying he would vote "No" due to what he perceived as "burdensome problems for businesses like Canon..." As such, he aligned himself with one of Long Island's biggest E-waste manufacturers.

Although the Senator co-sponsored all of the environmental community's priority Super Bills in 2008, he neglected to support any green bills in 2009, including legislation that would reduce global warming pollution and protect Long Island from rising seas.

And throughout the year, Senator Johnson did his best to stop progress on environmental issues by speaking out behind closed doors and encouraging others to join him.

While he has plenty of company with his failing grade of 58, the Senator's actions set him apart. New Yorkers have to wonder if he's listening to his constituents or caving to industry pressure and what negative impact his actions might have on our air, land and water in the years ahead.

Without a strong majority, lawmakers like Senator Johnson have the power to set the agenda among their peers and New York's environment is unlikely to be better for it.

LEGISLATOR OF THE YEAR



SHELDON SILVER (D-New York City)

Year after year, Speaker Silver and many of his Assembly colleagues lead the way when it comes to advancing protective environmental legislation in Albany. But it is clear that the Speaker took a personal interest in making sure a few environmental priority measures got across the finish line in 2009.

Speaker Silver was a key figure (he

is one of the “three men in a room,” after all) in negotiations on legislation such as the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) refinancing. From early support for aspects for the Ravitch plan, to working with his members to support limited tolling of certain New York bridges, to fighting to preserve and improve New York City transportation infrastructure in the final negotiations, the Speaker’s leadership paved the way for a refinancing deal that maintained service and minimized fare hikes.

The Speaker also took the lead on advancing and developing Green Jobs-Green New York, legislation designed to increase the State’s investment in energy efficiency and retrofit one million homes while creating thousands of new green jobs. The Assembly passed this bill with little controversy thanks in part to his efforts. From his steadfast support of colleagues such as Assemblymen Robert Sweeney and

Kevin Cahill to pursue solid environmental and energy policy, to his leadership on the Environmental Protection Fund and updating and expanding New York’s bottle deposit law to include bottled waters, the Speaker has a stellar record of achievement.

The numbers related to the Assembly’s accomplishments are striking. Under his leadership, the New York State Assembly passed nearly 40 environmentally significant and protective bills this year alone. The State Senate passed seven. We recognize the Speaker this year, not just for these efforts, but for his personal involvement in certain issues.

That’s why EPL/Environmental Advocates has chosen Speaker Silver as “Legislator of the Year” for 2009. Thanks to Speaker Silver, New York is a greener place to live.

HONORABLE MENTIONS

Senator Antoine Thompson (D - Buffalo)

In his first year as Chair of the Senate Environmental Conservation Committee, Antoine Thompson displayed an unwavering commitment to protecting New York’s air, land and water. He successfully guided a significant number of environmentally beneficial bills through his committee. He held hearings, rallied colleagues, served as a strong champion for environmental legislation, and reinvigorated the position of Committee Chair after years of inaction. Thanks in part to his efforts, New York’s bottle deposit law was updated to include bottled waters this year, a major achievement.

Senator Thomas Morahan (R - Nanuet)

EPL applauds Senator Morahan for bucking party leadership to support Green Jobs-Green New York, which will increase energy efficiency and create new jobs. The Senator wholeheartedly supported this bill and rallied his colleagues, on both sides of the aisle, to do the same. Thanks in part to his very public support, Green Jobs-Green New York passed 52 to 8. Senator Morahan is also to be commended for his long-standing leadership regarding legislative efforts to reduce global warming pollution.

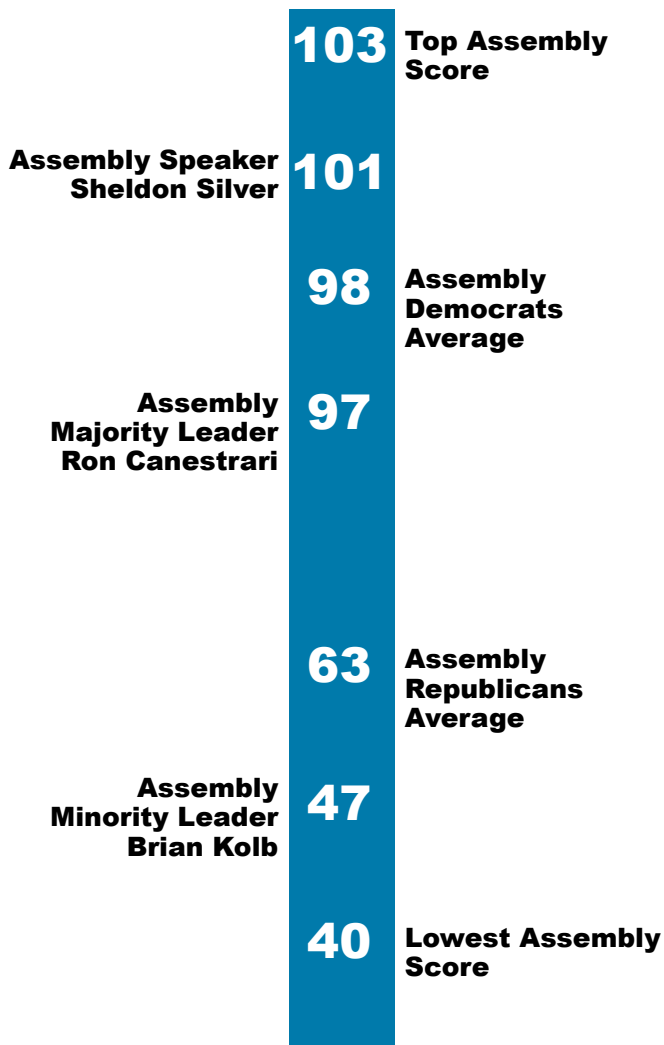
Assemblyman Robert Sweeney (D - Lindenhurst)

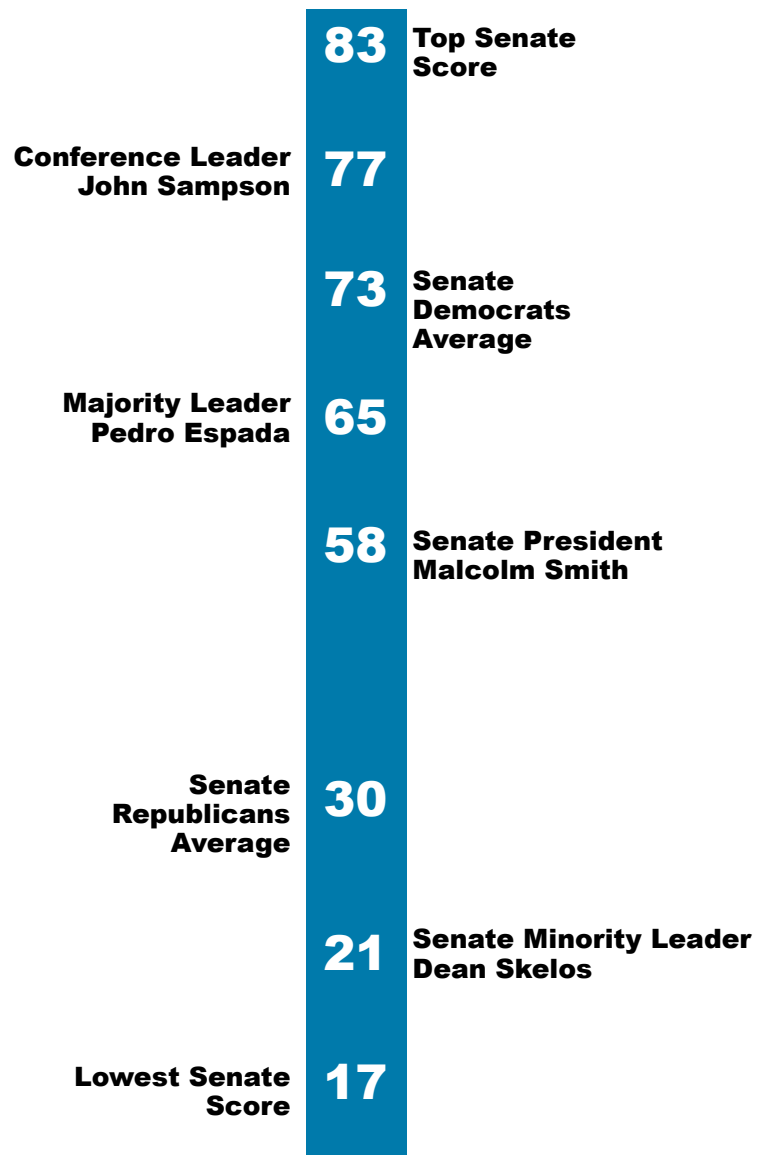

Super Bills

SUPER BILLS are legislative priorities chosen by the Green Panel, which includes representatives from New York State's leading environmental groups. Super Bills not voted on are scored on bill sponsorship. For more information see Page 16.

1. Bigger Better Bottle Bill

Expands definition of "beverage" in New York's bottle deposit law to include bottled water (excluding water with added sugar), directs 80% of unclaimed deposits to the State, and increases the handling fee for retailers and redemption centers. A.159-B/S.59-B passed as part SS of the State Budget. Enacted on April 7, 2009.

2. Environmental Access to Justice

Allows citizens to challenge State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA) decisions if they can demonstrate they will suffer environmental injury from a proposed project without having to show that such harm is different than harm suffered by the public at large. A.3423 (Bradley, et al)/S.1635 (Thompson, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

3. Wetlands Protection

Ensures protection of freshwater wetlands of one acre or more in size. A.6363 (Sweeney et al.)/S.848 (Marcellino, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee. S.4956 (Thompson, et al.) died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

4. E-Waste

Requires electronics manufacturers to collect and recycle a minimum percentage of annual equipment sales. Prohibits disposal of electronic equipment in traditional solid waste disposal systems. A.9049 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.6047 (Thompson, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

5. Global Warming Pollution Control Act

Establishes a greenhouse gas emissions (GHG) limit from all sources in New York and requires that the limit not be greater than statewide emissions for the year 1990. The statewide limit would be reduced to 80 percent below 1990 levels by 2050. A.7572 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.4315 (Thompson, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.



Three Tree Bills

Bills with THREE TREES will bring major benefits to New York's environment if implemented.

6. Recyclables in Landfills

Prohibits disposal of recyclable materials in landfills and incinerators and identifies materials for mandatory recycling, such as newsprint, glass, metal containers and certain plastics. A.1319 (Colton, et al.) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

7. Citizen Suits

Gives New York citizens the right to bring civil action against individuals who violate provisions of the State's Environmental Conservation Law, including protections against air pollution, hazardous waste, drinking water, solid waste facilities, mining sites and pesticide storage and application. A.4272 (Brodsky et al.)/S.1730 (Schneiderman, Thompson) passed Assembly; died in Senate Codes Committee.

8. Climate Change Solutions Act & Fund

Earmarks revenue from the sale of carbon dioxide emissions allowances under the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative for energy efficiency and clean energy and creates a dedicated clean energy fund. A.6321 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.2764 (Thompson, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Finance Committee. A.7017 (Gianaris, et al.)/S.5641 (Thompson, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Finance Committee.

9. Healthy Green Procurement

Establishes protocols for purchase of services, commodities and technologies by state agencies with the goal of minimizing adverse impacts on the environment and public health. A.7038 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.4991 (Thompson, et al) passed Assembly; died in Senate Finance Committee.



10. Ultra-Low Sulfur Oil Requirement

Requires that all No. 2 heating oil sold after January 1, 2011, for use in the State may not have sulfur content greater than 15 parts per million. Allows for a temporary suspension of the requirement in event of a shortage. A.8642 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.1145-A (Perkins, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.



Two Tree Bills

Bills with TWO TREES will bring substantial benefits to New York's environment if implemented.

11. Nuclear Preparedness

Directs the Public Service Commission to determine costs for governments to maintain preparedness for emergencies at nuclear facilities; establishes fees that nuclear facilities must pay to reimburse preparedness expenses. A.5193-A (Brodsky, et al)/S.4598-A (Stewart-Cousins) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

12. Power Procurement

Requires utilities to supply customer energy needs while taking steps to minimize volatility of energy prices. A.5409 (Brennan, et al.) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

Two Tree Bills, continued

13. Energy Planning Reauthorization

Re-establishes the State Energy Planning Board and requires the adoption of a final state energy plan every four years. Planning process would involve detailed analysis of short- and long-term statewide energy needs. A.5877-B (Cahill, et al.)/S.2501-B (Parker, Thompson) passed Assembly and Senate. Signed into law by Governor on September 16, 2009.

14. BPA Ban

Prohibits the manufacture, distribution and sale of certain toys, products, food and beverage containers, or containers lined with other materials containing Bisphenol A (BPA) intended for use by children under three. A.6919-B (Englebright, et al.) passed Assembly.

15. Outdoor Lighting

Develops efficiency standards for new and replacement outdoor lighting used by state agencies and public corporations, provides guidance for roadway and other nighttime lighting. Identifies appropriate areas for “dark sky preserves” to protect wildlife, enhance night sky viewing. A.7281 (Rosenthal, et al.)/S.2714 (Thompson, Parker) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

16. Net Metering Fix

Corrects laws passed in 2008 that allow businesses and commercial entities to net meter and increases the size of systems. Eliminates provisions that allow utilities to curtail the size of systems customers can install. A.7557 (Cahill, et al.)/S.4993 (Thompson, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Energy and Telecommunications Committee.

17. MTA Refinancing

Provides for the refinancing of the MTA's operating and short-term capital needs. Imposes a series of fees and taxes to support a robust transportation system. A.8180 (Silver, et al.)/S.5451 (Dilan, Perkins) passed Assembly and Senate. Signed into law by Governor on May 7, 2009.

18. Environmental Impact Reports

Requires Department of Environmental Conservation to issue biennial report listing areas most adversely affected by existing environmental hazards. A.8489 (Peoples, Rosenthal) passed Assembly.



19. Environmental Justice Advisory Group

Incorporates environmental justice principles into state agency decision making. Establishes permanent Environmental Justice Advisory Group within the Department of Environmental Conservation and an Environmental Justice Interagency Coordinating Council to report on effectiveness of environmental justice policies. A.8490-A (Peoples, Rosenthal) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

20. Assembly Article 10

Re-establishes the law that provides for expedited power plant siting and establishes power plant emissions performance standards and protections for lower-income and urban neighborhoods. A.8696 (Cahill) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

21. Green Jobs-Green New York

Directs the New York State Research & Development Authority to establish and oversee a statewide building efficiency retrofit program by financing energy efficiency audits and installations in residential, multi-family, nonprofit and small business structures. A.8901 (Silver, et al.)/S.5888 (Aubertine, et al.) passed Assembly and Senate. Signed into law by Governor on October 9, 2009.



One Tree Bills

Bills with ONE TREE will benefit New York's environment if implemented.

22. Utility Distributed Generation Reporting

Requires utilities to compile annual reports regarding distributed generation/energy metering to be submitted to the Legislature, Public Service Commission and State Energy Planning Board. A.237-B (Hevesi, et al.)/S.1660-A (Perkins) passed Assembly; died in Senate Energy and Telecommunications Committee.

23. Ulster County CPA

Adds Ulster County to the Hudson Valley Community Preservation Act (CPA), giving municipalities within Ulster County the power to choose for themselves whether or not to raise revenue through real estate transfer tax for the purpose of preserving natural and historic resources. A.593 (Cahill) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

24. Public Access to Information

Provides enhanced public access to information from the Department of Environmental Conservation through publications, open meetings and requests for public hearings. A.838 (Dinowitz, et al.)/S.2093 (Thompson) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

25. Transmission Line Intervenor Funds

Requires party filing an application to build a major electric transmission line to pay fee based on project size. Funds generated would be deposited into a state account to be accessed by municipalities, nonprofit organizations or relevant community groups to defray costs of participating in siting proceeding. A.1122 (Destito, et al.)/S.1599-A (Valesky, et al.) passed Assembly and Senate. Signed into law by Governor on August 26, 2009.

26. Wetland Neighbor Notification

Requires that nearby landowners are notified when a proposed activity in a tidal wetland requires a permit under state Environmental Conservation Law. A.2654 (Cusick, et al.)/S.507 (Lanza) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

27. Orange County CPA

Adds Orange County to the Hudson Valley Community Preservation Act (CPA), giving municipalities within Orange County the power to choose for themselves whether or not to raise revenue through a real estate transfer tax for the purpose of preserving natural and historic resources. A.2727 (Rabbitt, Gunther) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

28. State Agencies Greenhouse Gas Audit

Requires state agencies to conduct annual audit of greenhouse gas emissions, including steps taken to reduce emissions. A.3419 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.5689 (Thompson) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

29. Small Business Energy Loans

Establishes small business energy loans under which small businesses receive either 0% or reduced interest-rate loans up to \$100,000 to finance cost of facility improvements to reduce energy use. A.3945 (Weprin, et al.) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

30. Environmental Justice & Permits

Requires permit applicants to disclose if siting of new environmental facility in a low-income or minority neighborhood would result in disproportionate or inequitable burden on that community. A.4245 (Brodsky, et al.)/S.5778 (Thompson) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

31. Private Well Testing

Stipulates that when properties served by a private drinking water well are sold, the contract includes requirements to test the well for various contaminants. Test results would be shared with relevant departments to study groundwater supplies and groundwater contamination and included in the Department of Environmental Conservation's environmental facilities map. A.4557 (Jaffee, et al.)/S.2678 (Morahan, Hannon) passed Assembly; died in Senate Environmental Conservation Committee.

32. Increased Penalties for Wetland Violations

Increases and defines civil and criminal penalties for violations of the State's freshwater wetlands law. Raises civil penalties and sanctions for violations and for ongoing violations, makes each day's violation separate and distinct. A.4807 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.6145 (Schneiderman) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

33. Solid Waste Management Facilities

Requires applicants for permits who construct or operate solid waste management facilities to demonstrate facility's consistency with local solid waste management plans. A.5765 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.3777 (Thompson) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

34. Brominated Flame Retardant Ban

Includes decabromodiphenyl ether (deca-BDE), a suspected carcinogen, among brominated flame retardants whose manufacture, process or sale is prohibited (phase out by July 1, 2012). A.7573 (Sweeney, et al.) passed Assembly; not introduced in Senate.

35. On-Bill Financing Natural Gas Efficiency

Permits service charges on natural gas bills for the installation of improvements and fixtures to promote energy efficiency. Service charges would only be added to bills upon request with consumer consent. A.7736 (John, et al.)/S.3712 (Parker, et al.) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

36. Forest Preserve Land Exchange

A constitutional amendment to allow National Grid to construct a power line in St. Lawrence County on forest preserve lands in exchange for other lands to be added to the preserve. A.8284 (Sweeney, et al.)/S.2802 (Little) passed Assembly and Senate. Delivered to Secretary of State on July 8, 2009.

37. Power for Jobs Reform

Extends New York's Power for Jobs program until May 15, 2010. Requires participants of state subsidized low-cost power to undergo comprehensive energy audits funded by the New York Power Authority. A.8825-A (Cahill, et al.)/S.5979 (Parker) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

38. NYPA Efficiency & Renewable Energy Projects

Establishes energy efficiency and clean energy initiatives to be administered by the New York Power Authority (NYPA) and authorizes NYPA to fund projects, including high-performance building retrofits, equipment efficiency improvements, renewable technologies, and pollution-reduction technologies, among others. A.9040 (Cahill, et al.)/S.6050 (Stachowski, et al.) passed Assembly and Senate. Signed by Governor on September 16, 2009.



One Smokestack Bills

Bills with ONE SMOKESTACK will be detrimental to New York's environment if implemented.

39. Farm Dam Safety Exemption

Transfers state oversight for farm dams from the Department of Environmental Conservation's Dam Safety Bureau to the Department of Agriculture & Markets, exempting such dams from proper oversight and regulation. A.976 (Gunther, et al.)/S.2429 (Young) passed Assembly; died in Senate Rules Committee.

HOW LAWMAKERS' SCORES ARE CALCULATED

To calculate legislators' scores, EPL/Environmental Advocates uses ratings developed by our sister organization, Environmental Advocates of New York.

Legislators earn between 1 and 3 points respectively for votes in support of bills rated by Environmental Advocates as 1, 2 or 3 "tree" bills. Tree-rated bills are those that will benefit New York's environment. Legislators earn between 1 and 3 points for votes against bills that were given a rating of 1, 2 or 3 "smokestacks." Smokestack-rated bills are those that will harm the environment.

The Assembly voted on all five of the Super Bills; the Senate voted on one of the five.

Legislators earn points for supporting Super Bills as follows:

Co-sponsoring: Lawmakers receive half credit (1.5 points of a 3-tree bill) for Super Bills they sponsored or co-sponsored. If a Super Bill is voted on, the vote is counted in the score, but credit is not given for co-sponsorship. Members of the minority party who request to be added as co-sponsors also receive co-sponsorship credit.

Votes on motions to petition: Votes on motions to petition a Super Bill out of committee are counted as regular votes on the bill. Legislators voting in favor of a motion to petition a Super Bill out of committee receive 3 points. If the bill itself is voted on, that floor vote counts, rather than support for the motion to petition.

Becoming law: If a Super Bill is passed by both houses and signed into law, all legislators who vote for it receive 3 points plus 2 bonus points. This year one Super Bill was signed into law (Bigger Better Bottle Bill). As such, members who voted for this bill receive 2 bonus points, resulting in some lawmakers with scores greater than 100 percent.

Incompletes: Legislators who miss more than 20 percent of votes receive a score of incomplete or "Inc" in the *Voters' Guide*.

Notes:

1. The Climate Change Solutions Act & Fund, two complementary bills, is scored as one bill in the scorecard. One member of the Assembly, Peter Lopez, voted in favor of one bill and against the other. This legislator received an "N" to reflect this inconsistency in the scorecard.
2. Similar versions of the Electronic Waste Recycling Act were introduced in the Assembly and Senate. The bill scored in this guide reflects the final action taken on this legislation.
3. Assemblyman Ruben Diaz, Jr. vacated his seat during the 2009 Legislative Session after he won a special election for Bronx Borough President. He appointed Assemblywoman Aurelia Greene as his deputy. Assembly members Diaz, Jr. and Greene were replaced by Marcos Crespo and Vanessa Gibson, respectively. These lawmakers all received scores of incomplete in the *Voters' Guide*.

WHAT YOU CAN DO NOW THAT YOU KNOW THE SCORE

1. Hold legislators

accountable. If they voted to weaken New York's environmental safeguards, send lawmakers a note expressing your disapproval. If your legislators are working to protect New York's natural heritage, write to thank them.

2. Vote at the local, state and federal level.

Your vote is critical when it comes to whether or not New York State has a legislature that protects the air we breathe, the water we drink, and the health of our families.

3. Become a Member.

Join us and lend your voice to New York's first environmental advocacy group in the State Capital. See information below to learn how you can act to protect New York's natural resources.

Contact your lawmakers.

New York State lawmakers are in regular session every year from January through June. While they are scheduled to meet for six months, in recent years budget negotiations have led to lengthier sessions and "special sessions." Write your legislators: New York State Assembly, Albany, NY 12248, or New York State Senate, Albany, NY 12247. Call the Assembly at (518) 455-4100 and the Senate at (518) 455-2800.
